Following tradition, the New Families Liturgy and Reception launched the new 2010-2011 school year. Over fifty families participated in this year's event held on September 12, 2010.








"THE FLOCK IS IN SHOCK!"

Working at the CAR WASH!





sharing memories on facebook

We are pleased to reprint a few responses to our request for your favorite memories that is posted on Nazareth Academy Grade School's Facebook page.

From: Gordon "Kim" Dean, '69

I was on the waiting list to get in. Three weeks after the first grade started, I got in. I had already been going to the local public school in Trevose and I didn't want to be there so I laid my head on the desk and cried for almost a week. Sister Daniel was

very concerned but never really pushed me to stop. She let me cry it out and eventually I stopped.

My parents wanted me to attend Nazareth so badly that my commute to and from school started at 6:30 AM. My dad got on the train, and I got on a city bus that took forty minutes to drop me at the north end of the trolley line on Frankford Avenue. The trolley took about twenty minutes to drop me at the corner of Grant and Frankford. I walked the rest of the way. After

school, I went home the same way. I started first grade at four and a half years old and did this through the sixth grade when my parents bought the priests' house across the street, about the same time the new grade school was built.

Can you imagine? I was four and a half years old. I know they were different times, but there are days when I think my parents were a little out there with that decision.

The first grade was in the basement at the bottom of the stairs to the left. All the other grades were on the upper level. I remember the concession room where they sold candy during recess and lunch. The library was in the basement on the right side. I remember the walks to the cafeteria. I loved the Lawn Festival.



A student used to walk the halls ringing a bell to signal the end of class, lunch, recess and things like that. I was in the second grade and getting chased by some of the older kids and came around the corner and caught the bell in the teeth on the upswing. It knocked me and half of one of my front teeth out.

I was an altar boy most of the time and during the dedication of the building that took the place of the old grade school, I dropped the metal container that held the incense because I thought the Cardinal's helper had taken it from my hand. Incense was all over the place and everyone had to kneel in it. I still remember the crunching sound it made. It was very embarrassing.

The first floor had tiles and all the Sisters were very focused on keeping things like the desks and chairs lined up on the seams.

I remember both the Kennedy assassinations. With JFK, the whole school got the news and we prayed all afternoon. With RFK, by that time we lived across the street, the school held a Mass when the news was released.

I remember the pine trees.

I remember hanging around after school in the fourth grade for some reason, throwing erasers at somebody and ducking down and then up, splitting my head on the edge of a shelf. I bled quite a bit. The uniforms at the time were white shirts, red ties and blue pants. I remember riding the bus home that night and getting off the bus, my mother's reaction at the color of the shirt. I don't remember why I was allowed to ride home like that.

When they tore down the original school building, I kept a half of a cinder block with green paint on it. I kept it for years although I was never sure why.

I attended NAGS all eight years. I was going to attend St. Joe's Prep but my parents moved our family to Michigan.







Todav's classrooms bear little resemblance to our classrooms seventy years ago. Here at NAGS, you will find a treasure trove of technology: interactive whiteboards, response systems, sixty new computers and server, projectors, and now a wireless computer cart laden with thirtytwo DELL Inspiron Mini 10 net books.

Thanks to a grant offered through Title II Funding: Enhancing Education through Technology and American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, thirty-two net books are

helping students learn more effectively. Technology teacher Erin Bateman introduced the small laptops to each class, as well as to the faculty, during a recent meeting.

Online learning, or cloud computing, is definitely a growing trend as many schools use the web to deliver online curricula within virtual classrooms. The faculty's ability to draw from numerous instructional resources will provide greater reinforcement of lessons. In

addition, students can save their documents on the school's server, allowing them access to storage from any computer in the school.

In the future, NAGS looks forward to further expanding its academic environment beyond the classroom walls.


After all that "elbow grease" the students enjoyed tasting the freshly made butter on fresh bread.








last leaves off trees, Ms. Cusick's third grade class discovered the many varieties of trees on campus. Students compared shape, size and color of their leaf collections.






