These events are just a few of the many traditions celebrated throughout the school year. They bring us together and remind us what has value to




us, write deeply in our hearts and can make a significant mark in our family life.



OLIVIA SHARKEY, '05: A VOLUNTEER'S STORY

Olivia Sharkey of the Class of 2005, is a Junior studying Theology at St. Vincent College in Latrobe, PA. Olivia, sister of Alex Sharkey, '02, is a former NAGS Student Council President and NAHS Class President, and was also the President of the Class of 2013 last year at St. Vincent's. We are pleased to share Olivia's thoughts on a recent service trip in Taiwan and China.

I arrived home from my travels in Taiwan and China. What an experience. I learned guite a lot on this trip. I learn more about myself through my encounters with others, while also learning how to better understand and appreciate other people's gifts through my interactions with them. I reaped the benefits that come from keeping an open mind and trusting that God did indeed have a purpose fro me on this journey, even when it was challenging to notice. This trip was different than any other that I had previously been on. I didn't exactly see eye to eye with my coordinator at all times, and my primary focus of service for the trip may not have been the same as some of my fellow group members—but both these things afforded me the opportunity to learn and grow.

Our service work consisted of interacting with children - right up my alley! We had the wonderful opportunity to work with four separate groups of children: two separate Taiwan villages, a Taiwanese orphanage, and a Chinese orphanage. It was great to have the chance to experience a glimpse each child's daily reality, if only for a short time.

The Taiwanese villagers were just full of life and knew exactly how to love every minute of it! We tie-dyed t-shirts with them, gave tattoos and face painted and had a water balloon toss. Even though there was a language barrier, that didn't stop us from communicating one bit. We had the awesome privilege of being invited to attend their Sunday village mass. WOAH! One of the highlights of the trip for me - if only everyone could have the opportunity in their life to be a part of a mass like that. What a celebration! Their music and chanting was invigorating and their sense of community was overwhelming. What I noticed about the Taiwanese and Chinese people both times we attended mass during our trip was that they sing with their whole hearts, and everyone actively participates, even the children.

Another service we performed in the villages was the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. The sense of community in the villages was again made visible in this sacrament, and their vulnerability and ask for help was humbling.

Our visit to the Taiwanese orphanage (Jonah House) also consisted of the same activities of tie-dying shirts, etc. with the kids. We broke into groups and visited with different children each day, varying from babies, preschool and elementary kids.

A majority of these children were mentally challenged in some way or another. It was difficult switching from the village environment to the

orphanage. They each had their own issues: the village kids may have had parents, but many of them battled alcoholism, while the orphans had no family at all. As I held a Taiwanese orphan, I began to sing the song that my dad always sung to me - "You Are My Sunshine." As I sang, I became emotional because I realized that this child does not have a dad to sing them this song when they are upset, sick or cannot fall asleep. They do not have parents who understand them and wants the best for them in life. Yes, they have wonderful caretakers and nurses, who are as unconditional as they can be, but they have many children to tend to, and they come and go in shifts. However, this reality did not dull the hope that radiated in their eyes and in the smiles - It was contagious.

The preschoolers In the Taiwanese orphanage were a great deal of fun. They enjoyed just being carried and swung around, thrown in the air, and chased after. It was interesting to notice their ability and willingness to share with us, but not always with the other orphans. We realized



that this might be due to the fact that they are unable to really call anything their own - nothing was solely theirs that didn't need to be shared. This again was quite the realization.

The orphanage in China (China Little Flower) had just a substantial impact on me. The Chinese government only allows each family to have one child, so naturally the Chinese want their child to be healthy. Therefore, many of the children in this orphanage were either physically and/or mentally deformed. The sad reality is that many of these children were left by their parents at the hospital. The China Little Flower orphanage was a special place because it was a "half-way house" in a sense. These orphans came from their home orphanages to receive proper care for their disabilities and to recover from surgeries, sicknesses, or for premature children to more fully develop. Then, once they healed or became well enough, they returned to their home orphanage. Sister Gertrude, a director of the orphanage, said that many are in fact adopted upon their return, usually by foreign families. However, China Little Flower is also used as a hospice center for children who will most likely not recover.

On my first day at the orphanage, I became particularly attached to a baby girl named Li

Jing Fang, whose baptized name was Hannah. I cam to learn that she has a heart murmur as well as Down Syndrome. Even though she was approaching a year, she had no physical strength. She was unable to crawl, stand, or even support her own neck. But she honestly was the most content child I have ever encountered, never once crying or fussing. Her face usually was a simple expression, but a big smile would spring across her face when I tickled on her sides. I honestly could not let her qo.

I held her for the entire day. My mindset again revolved around the recognition I had while singing, "You Are My Sunshine," that Li Jing Fang had no one to call her own, so I decided that I would be hers for those three days. It was my way to afford her some constancy and unconditional love.

There was another child there named Pan Hong, who was four years old. She had a severely enlarged head and was only able to lay on her side in her crib. She was hooked up to breathing machines and it seemed that her mental development was minimal. My heart was broken when I saw her. I could not imagine a life that consisted of solely laying on your side looking out the same window, switching sides and having the crib turned around after bathing. I thought about volunteers and nurses there, and how many people actually interact with her on a daily basis. Despite the other children's disabilities, they are still able to come out of their crib and play on the floor, or to be held, or even cry out. Pan Hong could only lay there and I wondered how many people just took the time to sit with her. One day, as I sat rubbing her head while holding Li Jing Fang, I remembered learning in Psychology that humans need sensory stimulation to properly develop. We need to be touched and held. Knowing this just saddened me because I feared that pan Hong was not receiving all that attention and sensory stimulation that comes with childhood.

The people that I met these past two weeks will forever be in my heart. Their realities have opened my eyes to the many blessings that God provides for us in our daily lives, and how we can fail to recognize them or can take them for granted so easily. There children taught me the true meaning of being grateful and how important it is to live out that appreciation every day.

So thank you very much for caring about me, taking an interest in my life, for supporting me, and for providing me with such love. It was your influence in my life that allowed me to meet these children, learn from them, and provide them with a little more love. But it was not just me there — it was you, because your love is what has shaped me into who I am today.



Multi-Purpose Room Renovation Complete

After forty years, the original Multi-Purpose Room was finally the focus of a major improvement project this past summer. For three weeks, workers scraped, hammered and cemented their way to pave the way for a safe, sleek and efficient multi-purpose space.

After the original tile floor was removed, workers removed the tables that had hosted many lunches, assemblies and activities. The custom pocket-tables were delivered and installed in just a matter of hours. Sister Mary Ann stated, "The original pocket tables have seen advances in design since 1967. With one touch, the tables safely and effortlessly spring up and down, locking automatically into place. This is a major improvement for the school!"

Following the table installation, a new tile floor was laid, making a vast difference in the visual expanse of the room.

This project was made possible through several efforts and fundraisers. We are grateful to our Annual Fund donors, Quarter Quest and Walk-a-thon endeavors, as well as a DCED grant obtained through State Representative Dennis O'Brien and NAGS parent Mike Driscoll. 


Democracy In Action



CLASS OF 2004 REUNION WITH LING YOUNG

As the Class of 2004 was preparing for their Christmas break, they were also reserving a date for a reunion with a very special friend. The alumni, most of whom are now college seniors, had received an invitation from NAGS to reunite 9/11 survivor Ling Young at a Luncheon on January 5, 2012.

The Young Family's lives were changed forever on September 11th when Ling, who was on the 78th floor of the South Tower when the hijacked airplane hit the building. Although she was severely injured, Ling was one of the lucky people who escaped through the assistance of "the man in the red bandanna," Welles Crowther.

Several months after the 9/11 tragedy, Sister Mary Ann read about the long and excruciating recovery that Ling would face. Ling had stated that many people had perished in the disaster, but the injured survivors were being forgotten. Sister Mary Ann wanted to ensure that Ling would know that people cared about her and wanted to reach out to her with prayers, sympathy and love. Sister encouraged the Class of 2004, who were in sixth grade at the time, to begin writing and praying for Ling who was hospitalized for months. The special relationship we now hold with Ling and her family had begun. Along the way, Ling's journey of facing tragedy and loss was transformed into one of a renewed sense of hope and love of life.

Fast forward eight years: On the morning of January 5th, Ling was accompanied by her husband Donald, son Richard and granddaughter Julia. One by one the students waited their turn to greet Ling. She had seen the students grow from 6th to 8th graders but had not seen them since their June, 2004 graduation. In the eight years that had passed, the alumni had grown into adults! Ling, after enduring over forty operations to repair burns to her face, side and arm, looked radiant!

There to document the festivities were NBC, CBS, ABC and KYW radio. As the cameras rolled, the alumni and Ling joked about their photos on a display board and caught up with each other's lives.

Following the luncheon, all of the students, alumni and special guests assembled in the Multi-Purpose Room. The Student Council Officers presided over the program, explaining to the students how this unique relationship had developed and grown. Each class presented Ling with handmade gifts made in Art class with Miss Maria, such as an American flag mural, a collage and a book of poetry. In addition, the Class of 2004 presented to Ling a recorded version of the book, "All Things Bright and Beautiful."

After the Sonshine Kids gave an enthusiastic singing performance, Ling addressed the students, stating, "I have no words. I am overwhelmed and I thank you for such a beautiful show of support and love, for your prayers and for keeping me in your thoughts."

We salute Ling for the example she has set for all of us: one of courage, strength, faith and love. We thank her for taking the time to open her heart to the Class of 2004 as well as our current Nazareth students. Our students' lives are enriched through the friendship we enjoy with Ling and her family.

To the Class of 2004, we express our thanks for sharing the true Nazareth spirit and mission of family with Ling. We thank our alumni for their empathy and kindheartedness and most of all, for their attendance at the luncheon. The most important thing we can offer another person is our presence. The presence of the Class of 2004 is a testimony to the staying power of the lessons the students learned here at NAGS and to the sensitive and mature adults they are today!


organization. Thomas Goodman, Commander of VFW Post 1597 located in Croydon, Pennsylvania sponsors the contest in our area.
